



Job Title: Occupational Therapist

Position Summary:

Kids Who Count is a nonprofit organization with more than 30 years' experience serving families and young children with special needs in Utah County. Our mission is to empower families to optimize the developmental potential of their young children. Using the ABA (Applied Behavior Analysis) approach, our Autism Team provides evidence-based therapy to children with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) and their families. Our growing team is led by experienced professionals committed to developing skilled practitioners to serve our community.

The preferred OT for this position will be experienced in serving children with special needs. The Autism Team OT will be part of an interdisciplinary team, including behaviorally minded professionals, open to developing, implementing, and evaluating interventions in all areas related to Occupational Therapy.

Preferred Qualifications:

- A clinical background in theory and practice of pediatric occupational therapy.
- Minimum of 1-year experience working with children with ASD or other developmental delays.
- Strong working knowledge of all areas of early childhood development, including communication, gross and fine motor, cognitive, social-emotional, self-help, sensory and state regulation, and general health and nutrition.

Minimum Qualifications:

- Master's degree in Occupational Therapy. KWC verifies both degree attainment and educational institution accreditation following an offer of employment.
- Licensed in the State of Utah to practice Occupational Therapy.
- Use of personal vehicle with continuous automobile insurance that meets state minimum insurance requirements and an acceptable driving record.
- Pass a Background Criminal Investigation.
- Proficient in using a PC and/or tablet for email communication, scheduling, data entry and to submit and maintain personal work records for medical billing.

Job Responsibilities:

- Design and provide direct treatment to clients with ASD in one-on-one and group contexts through collaboration with the treatment team.
- Actively collaborate with the Autism Team, including Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBA's), Registered Behavior Technicians (RBT's), Speech Language Pathologists (SLP's) and Social Workers to develop an Individualized Treatment Plan (ITP) for home and center-based services.

- Evaluate program participants, 2 and older, for delays in fine motor, sensory processing, and adaptive skills. Review medical or background information to determine course of intervention and conduct ongoing assessment.
- Maintain accurate and timely data and documentation on clearly defined objectives to measure the impact of services as well as drive future treatment decisions.
- Consistently watch for ways to strengthen the treatment team's ability to integrate ABA principles and Occupational Therapy.
- Educate parents on their child's developmental progress.
- Occasional evening and weekend work may be required.
- Other duties as assigned.

Essential Skills:

- The ability to communicate in English in both written and verbal formats on a professional level. Fluency in conversational and written Spanish is a desirable skill for the position.
- Proficiency in organizing and managing work materials, a personal work schedule and accurate records.
- The ability to collaborate with members of an interdisciplinary team, following established policies and procedures, responding promptly to communications delivered through established channels, attending meetings and activities regularly and on time, meeting assigned deadlines, and resolving problems or differences of opinion within the appropriate team context.
- Establish and maintain relationships of mutual respect and trust with client families, co-workers, and community partners.

Physical Requirements:

- Hearing/listening, lifting, manual dexterity, pulling/pushing, seeing, sitting, speaking, squatting/kneeling, standing, and walking. Ability to play actively with children on the floor and endure some environmental health risks common to family homes, such as pets, secondhand smoke, etc.
